Wapello FFA Wins 2019 Iowa FFA Soils Career Development Event

The Wapello FFA Chapter from Wapello was named the Champion Team in the annual Iowa FFA Soils Evaluation Career Development Event held at Iowa State University on October 12, 2019. Members of the first place team included: Christopher Ewart, Lydia Fisher, Daniel Hemphill, and Emma Schoonover. Their agriculture education instructor and FFA advisor is Mrs. Danielle Wolfe. The South O'Brien FFA Chapter from Paullina was named the Reserve Champion Team. Members of the second place team included: Angela Nyunt, Bryce Rasmussen, Kaeley Einck, and Jack Farquhar. Their agriculture education instructor and FFA advisor is Mr. Eric Kumm. Katlyn Wiese, Ridge View FFA, Holstein, was named the High Individual Overall in the competition. The top five teams will represent Iowa at the National Land Judging Event in May of 2020 in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Montezuma FFA Chapter from Montezuma, Ridge View FFA Chapter from Holstein, and Pilot Creek FFA Chapter from Pocahontas will join the top two teams in Oklahoma.

FFA teams including from 30 chapters, including 117 individuals participated in this year's Career Development Event designed to provide the student an opportunity to display their agricultural knowledge and skills in the area of Soils Evaluation. The Soils Evaluation Career Development Event included the evaluation of four soil pits, plus a written exam about soils in Iowa. The score card used to judge the soil pits is divided into five parts: Surface Features, Soil Features – The Profile, Land Capability Classification and Productivity Potential, Evaluation of Management Practices, and Sustainability of Soils for Non-Agricultural Uses.

The Iowa FFA Soils Evaluation Career Development Event was made possible with support through the Iowa FFA Foundation. The Iowa State University Department of Agronomy served as the host for the event. Amber Anderson of Iowa State University coordinated the event.
