Wapello FFA Wins 2020 Iowa FFA Soils Career Development Event

The Wapello FFA Chapter from Wapello was named the Champion Team in the annual Iowa FFA Soils Evaluation Career Development Event held at Iowa State University on April 30, 2021. Members of the first place team included: Christopher Ewart, Emma Schoonover, Lydia Fisher, and Alex Boysen. Their agriculture education instructor and FFA advisor is Mrs. Cassi Chapman. The Montezuma FFA Chapter from Montezuma was named the Reserve Champion Team. Members of the second place team included: Alex Cheney, Gavin Tindle, Carmen Klos, and Lauren Klos. Their agriculture education instructor and FFA advisor is Mr. Rick Swenson. Emma Schoonover, Wapello FFA, Wapello, was named the High Individual Overall in the competition.

FFA teams including from 30 chapters, including 116 individuals participated in this year's Career Development Event designed to provide the student an opportunity to display their agricultural knowledge and skills in the area of Soils Evaluation. The Soils Evaluation Career Development Event included the evaluation of four soil pits, plus a written exam about soils in Iowa. The score card used to judge the soil pits is divided into five parts: Surface Features, Soil Features – The Profile, Land Capability Classification and Productivity Potential, Evaluation of Management Practices, and Sustainability of Soils for Non-Agricultural Uses.

The Iowa FFA Soils Evaluation Career Development Event was made possible with support from Iowa Corn and Ag Processing through the Iowa FFA Foundation. The Iowa State University Department of Agronomy served as the host for the event. Amber Anderson of Iowa State University coordinated the event.
